Learning Objectives

• I can develop a family safety plan for at home and while riding in the car.

Teacher Notes

• The teacher will need to stop the video after slides 4, 7, 8, 9, 11, 12, and 13 to elicit student responses.

Lesson Steps: Video Outline 3.3j Video

Step 1 Introduction

- What does being safe mean?
- What is a plan?
- What is a safety plan?

Step 2 Activity

• The teacher will work through the slides, pausing the video and allowing students to share their responses. After slide 13, students will find a partner to work with. The students will share a situation when they would need to have a safety plan in place and what steps should be in the safety plan. After each round, students will do exercises.

Round 1: Safety in the kitchen-5 push ups

Round 2: Safety in the car-5 sit ups

Round 3: In an emergency-5 squats

Step 3 Closure

• The students will complete the exit ticket provided below.

Assessments

Pre-assessment:

What does being safe mean? What is a plan? What is a safety plan?

• Post-assessment: The students will complete the exit ticket provided by the teacher.
